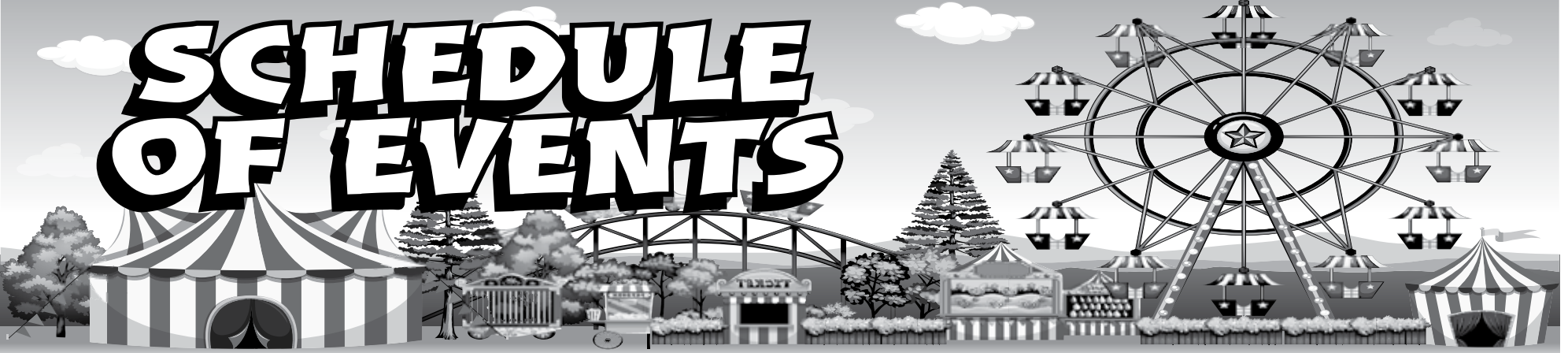

- From the South: Take Route 255 North to Junction 948. Turn left onto Route 948. Continue 2.5 miles to MJ's Mini Mart. Turn left onto Greens Road. Follow 1.5 miles to a Y-Intersection, turn left onto Dietz Road and travel 200 yards to the entrance.

GENERAL RULES


1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Elk County Fair.
2. The Fair Board reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgments may determine.
3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all animals and exhibits on display from injury and damage, but the Fair is not in any way to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire and theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
4. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. The same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette.
5. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock being entered, Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the judges will make the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so that the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
6. Department Heads reserve the right to refuse any entry especially if it is believed that the exhibits were shown in previous years. Furthermore, the Department Heads reserve the right to bar from competition animals and products of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. Department Heads may limit the number of entries per exhibitor.
7. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of an exhibit in bad condition, sick, or unruly. The Department Head must notify exhibitors of any exhibits that have become unfit. After having done so, the chairperson may dispose of the exhibit at his or her discretion.
8. No animal exhibit may be removed before close of Fair on Saturday night unless permission from the Fair Board is granted prior to the Fair each year. This is a yearly permission, not a free standing permission. Any exhibitor doing so will forfeit their premiums.
9. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as exhibitor. Entries are not limited to Elk County residents. Any exhibitor may be required to prove ability to reproduce entry in any department in the presence of a qualified person.
10. All entries must be registered on the Sunday of fair week between the hours of 11:00am-4:00pm in the exhibit hall. (REMOVED A LINE HERE)
11. All exhibits must be picked up between 10:00am-2:00pm on the Sunday immediately following the fair.
12. During judging, the buildings are closed to everyone except Fair Officials, judges, Pennsylvania Fair Fund Officials and attendants. Department Heads may enter exhibits in their own department. All livestock offered for premium must have been the property of the owner for 90 days or longer. Health papers are to be issued in the name of the exhibitor.
13. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter in charge of owner or employee. The Fair will have stand by attendants available during the youth judging or showing.
14. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will be disqualified from competition. Over fitting of cattle is discouraged.
15. Each exhibitor must furnish their own bedding and feed and must also see to the care of their animals.
16. Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
17. No unauthorized peddling will be permitted on the grounds or in the vicinity.
18. Intoxication, disorderly conduct, or obscene conduct is strictly prohibited. No alcoholic beverages or illegal substances are permitted on the Fairgrounds.
19. Unsportsmanlike conduct is grounds for disqualification at the discretion of the official in charge.
20. No animals, except handicap assist animals or those being exhibited will be permitted on the fairgrounds.
21. The Fair management reserves the right to remove any person engaged in any type of unacceptable behavior. Unacceptable is purely at the discretion of the Fair Management. No refunds will be given to the person removed.
22. Any check returned to the Elk County Fair for non-sufficient funds will be charged a fee of \$50.00 for each occurrence. Cash will only be excepted after that for any other transaction to the Elk County Fair.

ELK COUNTY FAIR CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

The Elk County Fair has adopted the IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics to curtail unethical, deceptive and fraudulent show ring practices. The Code can be found at www.IAFE.com OR contact any member of the Executive Board of the Elk County Fair and a copy will be mailed to you upon your request.

ANIMAL ENTRIES



Please read all rules before making animal entries. This includes the general rules, the rules specific to each Department, and the Code of Show Ring Ethics.




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ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Exhibitors will be expected to display their animals as directed by the chairperson, to accept the stall assignment without controversy, to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and cooperate with the department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
2. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves as to when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and a failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing.
3. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at show shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the judges.
4. Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competitions on the grounds Monday of Fair week. An exception is given to horses due to the fireworks display on Tuesday evening. Horses are required to be on the fairgrounds by noon on Wednesday of Fair week. All such animals shall remain on the premises until the Saturday of Fair week at 9:30pm.
5. The exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all equipment promptly as the Chairperson may direct.
6. All livestock, excluding rabbits, must be preregistered by calling the livestock Department Head 2 weeks prior to Registration Day. All hooved animals (cattle, horses, swine, goats and sheep) will be subject to a \$2.00 per head barn fee.
7. Due to space limitations, the Fair reserves the right to refuse any and all entries.
8. All interstate animals exhibited at Pennsylvania Fairs must meet the Pennsylvania requirements and must be accompanied by an interstate health certificate to be eligible for entry.
9. Animal owner or caretaker's verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship form must be filled out for each animal.
10. Location of animals in the barn(s) will be determined by the livestock Department Head. No one individual shall choose a stall at his or her discretion.
11. The PA Department of Agriculture recommends that animals returning home from fairs be isolated from other members of the herd or flock for 2-4 weeks to help prevent the spread of disease.

DEPARTMENT 1-HEALTH RULES FOR HORSES

I. Requirements:

1. Pennsylvania equines must have verification of a veterinary-client-patient relationship (see Chapter A.6). A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue) is preferred; alternatively, a VCPR Form can also be used, or at a minimum, a signed attestation on the entry form, to fulfill the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Act.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases
3. All equines must be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results should accompany each animal (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable), and should include the date of sample collection. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing recommendations. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal.
4. See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse, such as tattoos, brands, or microchips.
2. Permanent identification, including a microchip, tattoo, or brand

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR HORSES & PONIES SHOWN AT HALTER

1. Horses should not be on the fairgrounds until Wednesday due to the fireworks display on Tuesday night. A parent or guardian must be with a child and horse if the horse is present during the fireworks.
2. A horse will be considered grade if not a recognized registered breed listed and will be shown as grade.
3. A copy of registration papers, "negative Coggins" within the year, and proof of rabies vaccination are required with animal entry fee (barn fee) of \$2.00 per horse or pony. Fee is to be paid prior to the week of fair.
4. No stallions will be accepted for entry.
5. All animals entered must compete and be shown.
6. Boots or shoes with a distinguishable heel must be worn while riding anywhere on the competition grounds.
7. All competitors age 18 and under are required to wear approved helmets when riding.
8. Exhibitors must be properly attired for the show ring to present their horse or pony in halter classes.
9. In no case is it permissible to show more than one breed in the same class to be judged against each other for premiums except for the Grand and Reserve awards.
10. All exhibitors shall furnish their own animals feed and all stalls must be cleaned daily by the exhibitor.
11. No sleeping in the horse barns will be permitted.
12. Entries must be on the grounds and stalled by 12:00pm on Wednesday, the week of the Fair.
13. Release time shall be 9:30pm on Saturday the week of the Fair. Failure to keep the animal stalled will result in forfeiture of premium.
14. Stalls must be thoroughly cleaned at the end of the Fair and all decorations, staples, nails, etc. must be removed. Department Chairperson will inspect the stalls.

DEPARTMENTS 2 & 3-HEALTH RULES FOR DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE

I. Prohibition of exhibition of dairy cattle from influenza-positive, suspect, or high-risk farms:

1. Dairy cattle from a premises on which dairy animals are showing clinical signs of infection with influenza A virus are prohibited from entering an exhibition. Clinical signs may include a decrease in feed consumption, with a simultaneous decrease in rumination and rumen motility; respiratory signs including clear nasal discharge; and subsequent acute drop in milk production. Additional clinical signs may include abnormal tacky or loose feces, lethargy, dehydration, and fever. Severely affected cattle may have thicker, concentrated, colostrum-like milk or produce no milk at all. Animals showing clinical signs compatible with infection must be cleared by the State Animal Health Official.
2. Dairy cattle which have been on a premises where influenza A virus has been confirmed in dairy cattle are prohibited from entering an exhibition until that premises has been declared free of disease by the State Animal Health Official.
3. Dairy cattle which have been on a premises where influenza A virus has been confirmed in domestic birds are prohibited from entering an exhibition until that premises has been declared free of disease by the State Animal Health Official.
4. Dairy cattle which have been on a premises which is located within a three-kilometer area of premises where influenza A virus has been confirmed in domestic birds are prohibited from entering an exhibition until the State Animal Health Official has declared that area as free of disease, based on epidemiological investigation and surveillance testing.

Pennsylvania Cattle

I. Requirements:

1. Pennsylvania cattle must have verification of a veterinary-client-patient relationship (see Chapter A.6). A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue) is preferred; alternatively, a VCPR Form can also be used, or at a minimum, a signed attestation on the entry form, to fulfill the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Act.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.
3. Official identification is required for all cattle. Official identification includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag if applied prior to Nov. 5, 2024. This tag type is no longer valid for interstate movement if applied after Nov. 5, 2024.
 - (b) A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with “840” .
 - (c) Brands registered with a recognized brand inspection authority and accompanied by an official brand inspection certificate, when agreed to by the shipping and receiving State or Tribal animal health authorities; or
 - (d) Tattoos and other identification methods acceptable to a breed association for registration purposes, accompanied by a breed registration certificate, when agreed to by the shipping and receiving State or Tribal animal health authorities.
 - (e) See Chapter B.2 for additional ID requirements specific to the Farm Show Complex.
4. Influenza A testing requirements (applicable only if there is a case of influenza A in dairy cattle in Pennsylvania):
 - (a). The dairy animals shall have been part of a biosecure assembled group for a period of at least 30 days prior to the date of sample collection in accordance with subsection (b). below. New animals may not have been added to the herd or group within the 30-day period preceding the date of sample collection, or after the date of sample collection and before movement.
 - (b). Individual dairy animals 18 months of age and older shall be tested within the seven days prior to entry into the exhibition.
 - i. Lactating dairy animals—A milk specimen shall be collected for testing in accordance with the provisions of this section from each lactating animal. Milk specimens shall be collected in a manner that is in accordance with National Veterinary Service Laboratory (NVSL) guidance to the testing National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory.
 - ii. Non-lactating dairy animals—Nasal swabs shall be collected for testing in accordance with the provisions of this section from each non-lactating animal. Nasal swabs shall be collected in a manner that is in accordance with NVSL guidance provided to the testing NAHLN laboratory.
 - (c). Milk specimens and nasal swabs shall be collected and submitted by or under the supervision of an accredited veterinarian (category II). The accredited veterinarian collecting or supervising the collection of the diagnostic specimens shall have a veterinarian-client-patient relationship (VCPR) with the owner or caretaker of the animal.
 - (d). Alternatively, “Monitored Status” for herds enrolled in the Pennsylvania Lactating Dairy Cow Health Monitoring Program removes the need for individual animal testing.
 - (e). Each specimen or sample collected and submitted under this section shall be tested for influenza A virus using polymerase chain reaction (PCR) testing and protocols approved by NVSL.
 - (f). Testing of all specimens or samples collected and submitted under this section shall be performed at a NAHLN laboratory. The individual specimens shall not be pooled by the accredited veterinarian (category II) or any person other than at the NAHLN laboratory testing the samples.
 - (g). All dairy cattle arriving at an animal exhibition shall have been tested in accordance with this section and shall have a negative or not-detected test result. The laboratory test report, or a copy of the report, shall accompany each dairy cow to the animal exhibition and shall be made available to the holder or staff of the animal exhibition and any Department employee. Animals enrolled and in compliance with the Pennsylvania Lactating Dairy Cow Health Monitoring Program shall be accompanied by proof of program enrollment and compliance as provided by the Department.
 - (h). Exemptions: Dairy cattle less than 18 months of age are not required to be tested for influenza A virus prior to exhibition.
5. See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

1. While tattoos and brands are acceptable, 840 RFID tags are preferred.
2. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older.
3. Rodeo: It is recommended that Pennsylvania-origin rodeo cattle of all ages be negative on an official tuberculin test within 60 days prior to the start of the fair unless they are members of and originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd. The cattle can be accompanied by the negative test report, or the tuberculosis test results can be recorded by the veterinarian on a CVI.

DEPARTMENT 4-HEALTH RULES FOR SHEEP

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 of the current year is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
3. An animal owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:
 - An official USDA scrapie ear tag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie ear tags at 1-866-873-2824 weekdays from 9:00am-5:00pm. Your order may take several weeks for processing so order your tags early. OR
 - A USDA approved custom scrapie ear tag OR
 - A USDA approved scrapie tattoo with individual animal ID (tattoo) OR
 - An ISO compliant 15 digit ear tag (including RFID)
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

DEPARTMENT 6-HEALTH RULES FOR GOATS

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 of the current year is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
3. An animal owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - An official USDA scrapie ear tag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie ear tags at 1-866-873-2824 weekdays from 9:00am-5:00pm. Your order may take several weeks for processing so order your tags early OR
 - An ISO compliant 15 digit ear tag (including RFID) OR
 - A USDA approved custom scrapie ear tag OR
 - A USDA approved scrapie tattoo. Goats with an official scrapie tattoo must also have a unique individual animal ID (tattoo) to meet the scrapie ID requirement OR
 - Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

DEPARTMENT 9-HEALTH RULES FOR RABBITS

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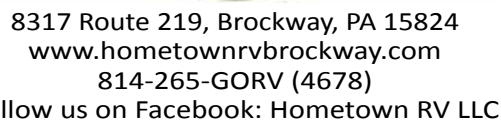

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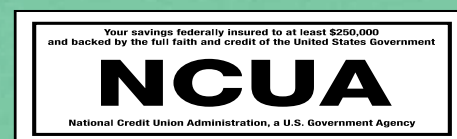

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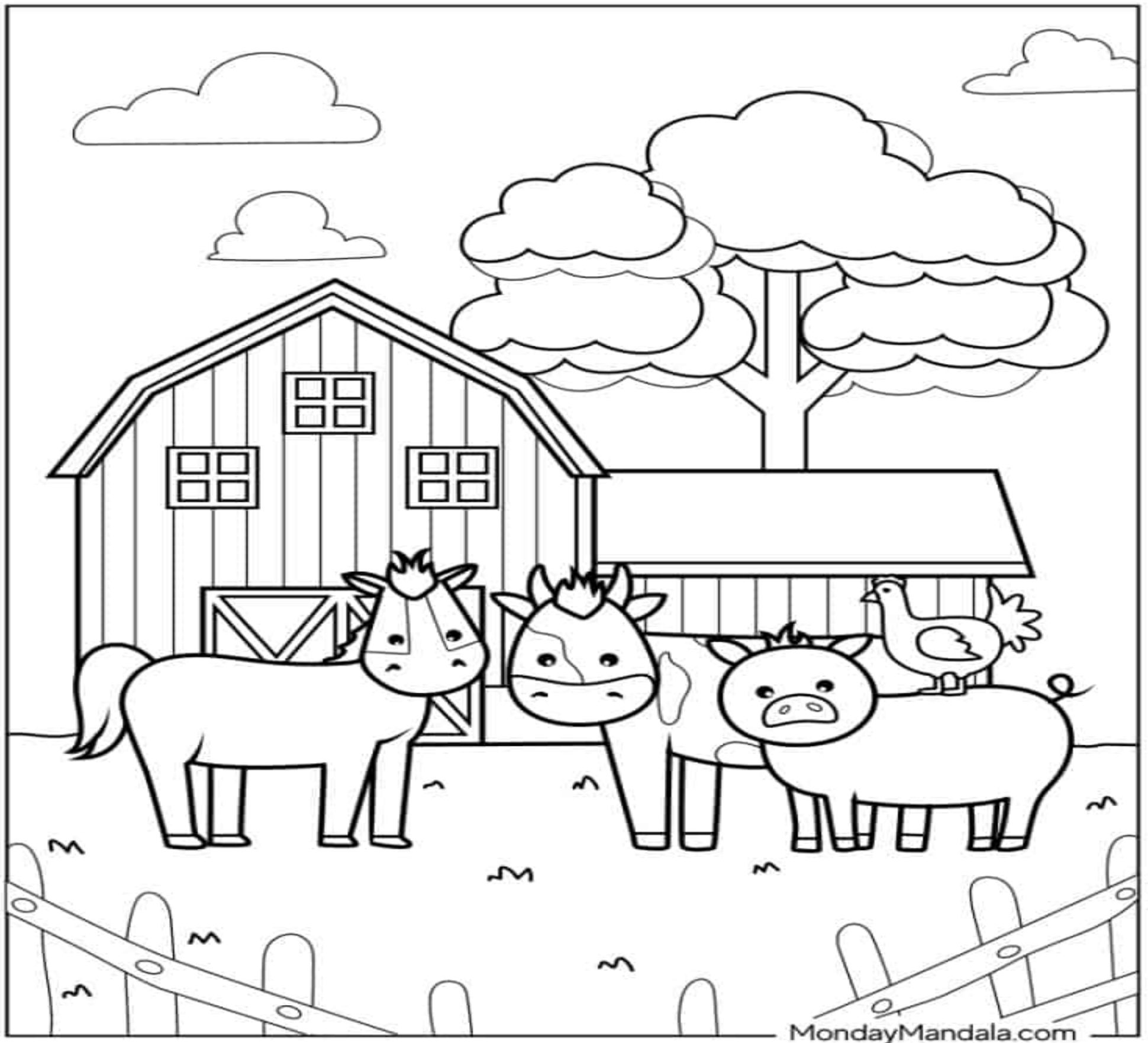
